Symbiosis International University (KEI)— Pune, India

Language Req: None
 Class Standing: Undergrads only
 Minimum GPA: 2.5
 Term Offered: Spring

Arts, Religion, and Social Change (SIT)—Bedulu, Indonesia

Language Req: None
 Class Standing: Undergrads only
 Minimum GPA: 2.5
 Term Offered: Fall, Spring

With this program, students will be integrated into Indian classrooms (courses will be taught in English). Class offerings include Indian Philosophy, Literature and Gender, Unearthing the Lost: Archaeology, and Heritage: Understanding, Interpretation, & Appreciation.

This program provides an intimate look at the unique Vajrayana Buddhist culture. This area, often referred to as "Little Tibet," is within the political territory of the far northern corner of Indonesia.

The London School—Central Asian Studies (SRAS)—Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan

Language Req: None
 Class Standing: Sophomore and above
 Minimum GPA: 2.5
 Term Offered: Year, Fall, Spring, Summer 2

This program combines intensive language study with courses on regional history of the specific countries and major cultures of Central Asia. Travel to Kazakhstan and Uzbekistan included.

Spanish Immersion in Mexico (SOL)—Oaxaca, Mexico

Language Req: Varied
 Class Standing: Any
 Minimum GPA: 2.0
 Term Offered: Fall, Spring, Year, Summer

This program offers a number of courses relevant to the Anthropology major, such as Human Rights in Mexico, Environmental Education, Mexican Civilization & Culture, Indigenous Religions, and History of Mesoamerica.

Degree Requirements for the Anthropology Major

Listed here are courses that you must fulfill as an anthropology major. There are several courses available overseas you can take to complete some of these requirements. In addition, you can find many electives abroad—even some that are not offered at UK. Just keep in mind that prerequisites need to be taken before the rest of your required classes, so plan accordingly.

PreMajor Requirements: ANT 220 (Introduction to Cultural Anthropology) ANT 230 (Introduction to Physical Anthropology) ANT 240 (Introduction to Archaeology)

Major Requirements: One course selected from any of the below, in consultation with faculty advisor. In addition, students must choose two additional courses from the list to create a regional focus: ANT 221, 241, 242, 320, 321, 322, 323, 324, 327, 342, 431G, 432, 470G, 534, 555

Sub-disciplinary Breadth: Three courses from at least 2 sub-disciplines. Most courses offered once every two years.

Cultural Anthropology: ANT 340, 375, 401, 429, 433, 435, 525, 532, 538, 550

Physical Anthropology: ANT 332, 333, 440

Archaeology: ANT 320, 322, 342, 541, 543, 545, 555, 585

*In addition, students must take a course in anthropological theory, anthropological method, and senior integrative seminar.

Education Abroad Programs for Students of Anthropology

UK Education Abroad offers a variety of programs that allow you to study anthropology in an international setting. Immerse yourself in another culture, expand your knowledge of anthropology, and explore what the world has to offer with any one of the exciting opportunities available to you!

Why study abroad?

Education abroad can help you...

- Experience anthropology first-hand
- Globalize your world view
- Expand your intercultural understanding and problem-solving skills
- Prepare to work in an increasingly diverse and international workplace
- Gain new insight into the world and yourself
- Increase your language skills

As a student of anthropology, the best way to increase your knowledge is to immerse yourself in various cultures and diverse environments. There is no substitute for the experience that a semester, year, summer, or winter abroad will give you.

Do I have to speak a foreign language to study abroad?

Absolutely not. There are plenty of programs in English-speaking countries. Furthermore, students can find anthropology courses taught in English in practically every country. Of course, there are also plenty of excellent programs for students who prefer to study anthropology in a foreign language or to study a foreign language while abroad.

Where can I study abroad?

Anthropology is a global enterprise. From the Gold Coast of Australia to historic Istanbul, Turkey, UK offers a wide array of programs that allow students to take anthropology courses in all corners of the world.

How can I afford to study abroad?

The Education Abroad office offers scholarships for students interested in studying abroad. These scholarships range from \$500-\$1,500. Stop by one of the information sessions on scholarships or visit the Education Abroad website for more information.

Additionally, most UK financial aid applies towards the cost of studying abroad! Check with your financial aid advisor for more information.

Finally, please note that there are several education abroad programs that are comparable to the cost of attending UK. So, with a little bit of planning, if you can afford to attend UK, you can afford to study abroad.

What are my next steps?

Attend a First Step Session.

Find out what you can study abroad and where, and ask questions about the application process, financial aid and scholarships, etc. First Step Sessions are held on Mondays and Tuesdays from 4-5p.m. and Wednesdays and Thursdays from 3-4p.m. in 207 Bradley Hall.

Explore the programs available.

Search online or visit the Education Abroad Resource Center in 315 Bradley Hall.

Talk to an Education Abroad advisor.

Each UK Education Abroad advisor has expertise in specific majors and geographic regions. Check the website and make an appointment with the advisor who is an expert on the programs in which you are interested.

PROGRAM TYPES

UK Sponsored

These offerings include those programs facilitated by UK faculty and staff that have been vetted and approved by Education Abroad or select customized programs offered in conjunction with Education Abroad. These programs are typically completed during the summer or winter Intersession. UK students pay regular UK tuition and fees and earn UK credits.

UK Exchange

These offerings include university-wide or departmental exchanges and select ISEP Exchange programs. Students pay UK tuition and fees and earn transfer credit while abroad.

UK Consortia

These offerings include select KIIS, CCSA and other consortium-based programs for which UK is a voting member. Tuition and fees are paid directly to the program provider and students earn transfer credit.

UK Direct

These offerings include select programs hosted by an international institution in which students enroll directly or facilitated through ISEP-Direct. Students earn transfer credit.

UK Partner

These offerings include select third-party provider programs and other internship/service-learning based programs, for which students earn transfer credit.

UK SPONSORED EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAMS

Internship: Summer in Cape Town (Arts & Sciences) —Cape Town, South Africa

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Undergraduates only
Minimum GPA: 2.0
Term Offered: Summer 1

Students will receive 6 hours of internship credit - EXP 396 and A&S 300. Internship opportunities include advocacy organizations and media campaigns for human rights issues, as well as environmental education.

The Nile River: A Study of Water Politics in Africa Jinja, Uganda; Kampala, Uganda

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Undergraduates only
Minimum GPA: 2.25
Term Offered: Summer 1

This program will take students to the upstream countries of the Nile (mainly to Uganda) to experience first-hand the physical and human environments surrounding the sources of the Nile River and along its flow toward Sudan and Egypt. Undergraduate students will enroll in HIS 355: Riparian History along the Nile Basin and INT 350: Studies on the Geographies, Societies, and Politics of the Nile.

UK EXCHANGE EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAMS

National University of Ireland-Maynooth (Exchange) - Maynooth, Ireland

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 3.0
Term Offered: Fall, Spring

This university boasts the only full degree program of anthropology in Ireland. Upper-level courses include Linguistic Anthropology, Psychological Anthropology, and Medical Anthropology (Affliction & Healing).

Kansai Gaidai University (Exchange)—Hirakata City, Japan

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 3.0
Term Offered: Year, Fall, Spring

Most anthropology courses are related to Japanese society and culture. Examples include Gender & Sexuality in Japan, Japanese Society in Anthropological Perspective, and Cross-Cultural Social Experience.

University of San Francisco—Quito (Exchange)—Quito, Ecuador

Language Req: Advanced Spanish
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 2.0
Term Offered: Year, Fall, Spring, Summer

Take classes in Spanish at a university in Ecuador. Students are able to choose from any of the classes the university offers such as Spanish Language and Literature.

UK CONSORTIA EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAMS

KIIS Denmark —Copenhagen, Denmark

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 2.0
Term Offered: Summer

Courses available include Viking Archaeology, Archaeological Methods, and Modern Europe and the Danish Microcosm. Students typically take 1-02 courses during the summer program.

KIIS Mexico
—Merida, Mexico
Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 2.0
Term Offered: Summer

Courses available include People of the Corn, Mexico in the 21st Century: Culture, Development and Politics, Spanish Culture, and Spanish language.

KIIS Ecuador —Quito, Ecuador

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 2.0
Term Offered: Summer

Available courses include Peoples and Cultures of Latin America, Physical and Biogeography of the Andes, among others. Students typically take 1-02 courses during the summer program.

How do I choose the education abroad program that is right for me?

Look through the information in this advising guide for an overview of the programs available to UK students. You can also find more detailed descriptions online. To get started, it is important to consider the type of program you would like to attend, descriptions of which are on the left. Consider the following important questions.

When can I study abroad?

- You can study abroad for an entire academic year, during the Fall or Spring semesters, Winter Intersession or over the Summer.

Where will I live?

- Most programs provide accommodation for students in residence halls and foreign student dormitories. Some programs, particularly ones that focus on language immersion provide the option of living with a local family.

Will I earn credits while abroad?

- Yes! Earn credit towards your biology major abroad, or get some electives out of the way. Please check with your Director of Undergraduate Studies to make sure specific courses will count towards your major.

How much does it cost?

- Programs vary in cost depending on the program type, duration, and provider. Please be sure to familiarize yourself with the costs of the programs you are considering.

UK DIRECT EDUCATION ABROAD PROGRAMS

Sichuan University (ISEP Direct) — Chengdu China

Language Req.: English
Class Standing: Sophomore & Above
Minimum GPA: 2.75
Term Offered: Fall, Spring

This program is designed to provide students with an understanding of Chinese culture, both past and present. Course offerings include classes on Chinese culture and society, minority experiences in China, Chinese history, Chinese religion, and more.

University of Savoie (ISEP Direct) — Chambéry, France

Language Req.: Beginning French
Class Standing: Sophomore & Above
Minimum GPA: 2.75
Term Offered: Fall, Spring, Summer 2

The University of Savoie program offers two options for interested students. The first option contains courses taught in French on an array of subjects, including French culture. The second option is a blended curriculum of French language (at all levels), and courses in French studies.

University of Haifa (Direct)—Haifa, Israel

Language Req: None
Class Standing: Any
Minimum GPA: 2.5
Term Offered: Summer 2

The University of Haifa offers independent summer archaeological field schools in northern Israel. These programs typically last throughout June and July, with different length options ranging from 2 weeks (2 credits) to 6 weeks (6 credits). Classes include Techniques in Field Archaeology and Trade and Maritime Aspects of Mediterranean Cultures during the Bronze Age.

When should I study abroad?

Most UK students study abroad during their sophomore or junior years. However, there are programs available for freshmen and senior students as well.

Another important decision to make is what time of year to study abroad. Programs are available for the academic year, the Fall and Spring semesters, Winter Intersession, and the Summer sessions. It is also possible to take a spring-embedded course, which is a class taught at UK with an international component during spring break or early summer.

Because many foreign institutions follow different academic calendars, it is important for students to consider the specific dates of the program far in advance. For example, many “fall” semester programs in the Southern Hemisphere may run from July to November and from February to June during the American spring semester.

Similarly, it may be difficult for students to study at some European institutions for the fall semester. Final exams may be scheduled in early January, and many programs do not make allowances for US students. Please be sure you consider this issue in advance.

Many students choose to study abroad during the Summer or Winter sessions. There are two summer sessions available: Summer I and Summer II. Summer I programs typically occur during May and early June, while Summer II programs tend to start late in the summer and end in late July or early August. The Winter Intersession occurs between the fall and spring semesters.
