Vellorimo Suminguit (PhD '97) Safeguards Intangible Cultural Heritage in the

Philippines

Dr. Vellorimo Suminguit is an expert in indigenous knowledge and intellectual property and a member of the faculty in the department of Behavioral Sciences at Central Mindanao University, Philippines. He received his dissertation in 1997 under the direction of Dr. John Van Willigen and recently crossed paths with current UK anthropology professor <u>Hugo</u>
Reyes-Centeno at the **Second International**

Mamanwa Dialogue Symposium at St Paul University in Mindanao. Dr. Suminguit, better known as Vel when he was here at the University of Kentucky, has served as the president of Friends of the Lumad, a network of people and organizations that advocates for human rights and ecological justice across the Philippines but more particularly in solidarity with the Lumad indigenous people. His UK training prepared him to undertake a **project funded by the**International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD), which he presented at a UNESCO international workshop. He is also a UNESCO global facilitator for safeguarding intangible cultural heritage (See Vel's profile here)

Andrea Strassburg (BA '99) Crusades for Access on Campus, in Lexington, and Beyond

Andrea Strassburg received her BA from the Anthropology Department and has gone on to a 26-year career with UK Healthcare. She received a master's in Rehabilitation Counseling and currently works in Trauma Surgical Services. She states that her anthropology degree has helped her become an advocate and prepared her to work with patients and their families. In her own words, the degree has "helped with my true purpose in life: paying it forward, being as blessed as I have been as someone with a disability".

Strassburg has had a number of accomplishments. She has been made a **Kentucky Colonel** for her advocacy work in

epilepsy. She has been on the UK Staff Senate since 2010. She has chaired the **Access Lexington Commission** (formerly referred to as the Commission for People with Disabilities) and in that capacity was able to ensure the inclusion of Accessible Neighborhoods in the city's Long Range Plan. In 2022 she was commissioned by Governor Beshear to sit on the Kentucky Statewide Independent Living Council and currently serves as vice chair of the Council. In 2023, she was one of the recipients of UK's **Sarah Bennett Holmes Award**, recognizing employees who have made exemplary contributions to "issues that affect women at the university and across the Commonwealth."

PhD Candidates Keppeler and Roberts Win Wenner-Gren Dissertation Fieldwork Grants

In late Spring, <u>James Keppeler</u> and <u>Michelle Roberts</u> were both awarded prestigious grants from the <u>Wenner-Gren Foundation</u>.
